International Yoga Day



Fire Drill

A Fire drill was conducted in our school premises on June 19 2019 with the help of sports faculty. This exercise was in integration of a grade 7 English lesson topic on FIRE.

The purpose of the fire drill was to ensure that everyone knows how to exit safely as quickly as possible if a fire, smoke or other emergency occurs. Students were trained to recognize the sound of the fire alarm as this can help to reduce confusion, panic, and any disorderly behavior in an emergency. It also served to familiarize teachers, students and other responsible people with their role such emergencies.



The Students of Grade 7 were trained by Mrs. Kanaka Durga, sports HOD on all aspects of evacuation in the event of a fire, and were assigned the duty to help all the other students to evacuate the school during the fire drill.

Drill monitors from Grade 7 along with sports faculty helped the students (accompanied by respective teachers), exit their classes quietly and reach the assembly point where attendance was checked before dispersal to the classes.





Exams:

Cambridge Checkpoint Exams:

The results of the Cambridge checkpoint exams in Math, Science and English were declared on June 20th. There were a total of 13 entries from grade 8 for Math, Science and English. Our students have come out in flying colours, scoring a very high average of 4.5 in English, 5.2 in Science and 5.6 in Math out of a maximum score band of 6. Epistemo congratulates the students for their splendid performance and hopes that our school will continue to grow from strength to strength in this regard.

Cambridge Checkpoint exams in English, Mathematics and Science are conducted by the Cambridge board at grade 5 and grade 8 level, and give valuable feedback on learners' strengths and weaknesses before they progress to the next stage of education. The tests are marked in Cambridge and provide schools with an external international benchmark for learner performance.

Cyclic Tests

Cyclic tests for grades 1-10 are conducted in the third and fourth Tuesday of every month. In June, assessments were conducted for English and Math across all grades. These grades will be considered as part of formative assessments for students.

Remedial sessions & Special Classes

Addressing a recurring concern of parents, Epistemo has allotted 3 remedial classes per week for each grade in the first hour of the day. After school special classes have been scheduled for students of grade 10 in all the main subjects. It is expected that the additional emphasis and extra practice will help the students approach the board exams with confidence.

Clubs & Competitions

The school has introduced a range of clubs- Literary, Civic Literacy, Work-education and Entrepreneurship in this academic year. These clubs are part of our effort to inculcate life-skills and confidence in our students to face up to the challenges of the 21st century. This month the clubs featured Master Chef & literary club activities like crosswords (grades 1-4), storytelling (grades 5-8) and Story writing (grades 9 &10).

















Classroom Activities

The Children of Grade-4 who are learning about circuits in science had an interesting time, with hands-on activities being conducted in the classroom. Students had fun with circuits, creating both open and closed circuits with simple materials like cardboard, pins and wires. The young 'engineers-in-the-making' also observed the light bulb up close and identified the parts of the bulb.









Students of grade 10 created a model of Nephron using readily available materials like glass paints, oil paints,



Students of grade 5 did a role-play activity on the circulatory system-The learners did a role play on blood and the path that it follows in and out of the heart, moving in sequence through the different chambers of the heart, to the lungs for gaseous exchange and again back to the heart to be supplied to the entire body. They enjoyed the activity and at the same time learnt about the tricky circulation route in a fun way.

Student-Speak

This section will feature interesting write-ups, poems and artwork by our students.

The students of grades 8, 9, 10 went on a field trip on the 28th of June. In this field trip, we got to know about how Zinda Tilismath and the iconic Parle G biscuits are made.

At the factory of Zinda Tilismath, we were told about how the unique unani medicine is manufactured in an eco friendly method and about all the ingredients that go into it. The facility was built around a century ago and still continues the legacy of the founder, late Hakim Mohd. Moizuddin Farooqui. He is known for researching and developing the medicine. We were even explained about the deep meaning inside the logo and the trademark of Zinda Tilismath. The facility produces five other products, making it a total of six products. These include Faaroky tooth powder, Zinda Balm, Zint Lozenges and two flavors of churan: raw mango and kaala khatta. After the tour of the factory, we were given complimentary samples of all the products.

After the Zinda Tilismath factory, we moved on to our next stop, the Parle G factory. The facility we went to manufactured the iconic Parle G and Hide and seek biscuits. We were taken into the facility where prepared dough of wheat, milk, sugar and oil were molded into rectangles and sent for baking where the temperature varies between 150 to 300 degrees Celsius. Then they were taken to the packing station where freshly baked biscuits were packed into wrappers. We were given a packet of warm biscuits after the tour of the facility.

Students of 8A, 9th and 10th grade went on an educational field trip this Friday. The first place that they visited was the Zinda Tilismath factory. Zinda Tilismath is a 100% herbal and natural Unani medicine, which is used to treat more than twenty common ailments. It was founded by Hakim Mohammed Moizuddin Farooqui. The guide at the factory listed out all the ingredients used to make the product and explained their purpose. It is made of Eucalyptus oil obtained from the Tasmanian Blue Gum plants in Ooty, menthol crystals that we get from the peppermint plant, camphor of medicine grade, Thymol crystals and Rangbasa.

Following the explanation, the students were led to a laboratory where the process of making the product was explained. Eucalyptus oil stored in blue barrels are poured into steel containers, and all ingredients except Rangbasa are added into it. The mixture is let to sit for 48 hours so that the ingredients are dissolved in the oil. Finally, the Rangbasa or the dye for the medicine is added separately as it doesn't dissolve in the oil.

The students then found out that the factory is eco and environment friendly as well as a power saving factory. This was evident though the fact that there is no combustion in the factory and there was negligible electricity used on site.

Next, the pupils watched the workers pack the product bottles into boxes along with the directions. They tried packing some themselves as well. The speed and efficiency with which the workers did the packing was truly astounding.

At the end, all students received complimentary products made at the Zinda Tilismath factory, and took a few clicks with them.

The group then proceeded to the second and final stop - the Parle G factory. As the children ate lunch, they watched an informative but innovative video that explained the process of making Parle - G products. The students then set out to watch the process live, after putting on hair caps to maintain hygiene. The live demonstration consisted of various steps - the first one being baking, where the dough is baked at various levels ranging from 150° to 300° . The second step was the cooling, followed by packaging.

Here too, everyone received a complimentary Parle - G biscuit pack. The trip ended with the group posing for another set of pictures with the biscuit packs.

The trip was a good learning experience for the students and the teachers as well. It combined fun with knowledge to make the learning process exciting.
