Here's a look-back at all the happenings of the month of March and April 2019 .

Events & Happenings in Campus:

Throw ball tournament on 2 & 3 March.

Epistemo Vikas Leadership School played host to the 6th Sub-junior Inter District Throw Ball competition organised by the Throwball Association of Telangana on 2 & 3 March'19. A total of 8 districts (Adilabad, Nizamabad, Ranga reddy, Hyderabad, Karimnagar, Mehboobnagar, Medchal and Sangareddy) and 250 players took part in the competition.

Ranga Reddy District bagged the winner's cup, while Hyderabad stood 1st Runner up and Adilabad stood 2nd Runner up in the Girls category.

In the boys category, Nizamabad took home the winner's cup, while Hyderabad bagged 1st Runner up and Ranga Reddy stood in 2nd Runner up position.

The event was presided over by Mr. Naveen Yadav - President Telangana Throwball Association, Mr. Venkat & Mr. Sideswar Reddy - Organizing Secretaries, Ms. Hema Surapaneni, Principal of Epistemo and Ms. Vijayalakshmi, Principal, Sangamitra School. The winners were appreciated for their performance and felicitated with medals and trophies.

Selected players will represent Telangana State in 6th Sub Junior Throw Ball Nationals going to be held at Akshara International School, Hyderabad on 25 & 26 April'19.







Annual Exams:

The final exams for the academic year 2018-19 was conducted between 27 February and 8 March. The results were declared on the PTM held on 16 March. In a new initiative, the results and reports were despatched electronically through the MyClassboard platform to save paper, and encourage others to do the same. After a short break, the students started the new term of half-day school on March 18, 2019.

New Term:

Students of grades 1-10 began their new term for the next academic year on March 18. In an effort to strengthen their basics and give them enough practice on concepts learnt earlier, the new term was devoted largely to revision and preparation for the lessons of the next academic year. English and Math concepts in particular were revisited to ensure that knowledge gaps if any, were filled and the students met the criteria for learning levels required for the next level.

As part of our academic goals for the coming year, key areas which are conceptually important for scaffolding the learning process for the next level were identified and revisited.

For grade 10, the syllabus started right away, so that portions can be completed well in advance, ensuring ample time for revision.

Special assemblies

Our lemurs are back to school on March 18, after a short break. They seemed enthusiastic and energetic with new spirits in the journey of student hood. The assembly was short and simple with a set of instructions about the summer academic session from our Principal, Ms. Hema Surapaneni. She wished our lemurs good luck for their new session and also welcomed new lemurs into the Epistemo family.

The last assembly for this academic session before the school closed for vacation was held on Tuesday, 9 April. Principal, Ms. Hema Surapaneni ma'am addressed the assembly by giving instructions pertaining to the following two days. She also discussed about the holiday worksheets that would be sent through MCB which the students were expected to complete and handover for assessment upon reopening. The winners of the Maths, Science & Cyber Olympiad were awarded with certificates and medals during the assembly.

Following the prize distribution, there was a program conducted by GHMC representatives to educate the students to recycle and reuse waste. Students were asked to separate waste at home into dry and wet waste and then recycle and reuse them for other use. The representatives also encouraged students to bring waste materials like books, torn and tattered clothes and shoes to school be exchanged for notebooks and stationery for the School Recycling Drive.

Recycling Drive with GHMC Collaboration

Following the GHMC awareness program held on 9 April, Epistemo conducted its annual recycling drive at campus on 10 April. Students and teachers collected all kinds of recyclable waste from their homes and from around the campus to be exchanged for books and stationery. Many of the students came forward to donate the new notebooks and stationery received to orphanages, and appreciating their generous gesture, it was decided all donations of books and stationery would be handed over to deserving children by the students themselves, when the school reopens in June.





Reading Program

We understand that our children learn best when they're having fun. To foster their interest in reading and to add a fun element to the whole reading process, we have decided to come up with a reading program for grades 1-5. Reading programs that encourage children to drop everything and read are designed to teach children the core literacy skills needed to be successful at school. They are designed to not only improve their vocabulary and reading skills, but also boost their confidence.

Our teachers went on a book hunting spree at a renowned bookstores in the city to gather a treasure trove of books for the children. These books will be sorted grade-wise and kept in classroom libraries that the children will have easy access to. Students can reserve books and read in class whenever they have spare time, or after finishing their work, with the permission of the teacher in charge.





Holi Celebration

Holi, the festival of colours was celebrated with joy and pomp in the pre-primary wing. A cultural show was organized where the little ones sang, danced, shared sweets and sprinkled colours on each other. Little ones were educated not to waste water and use herbal colours only. It was a really colourful day!






Global Perspective Project and Presentation

Learners of grade 8 were part of the Global Perspective project, which showcased the cultural beliefs and values of different countries like India, China, Middle East, United Kingdom, Africa and United States of America. The complete research work was done by the students and they coordinated with each other to complete the project within 9 days, which is a remarkable achievement. In the process, they did extensive research in terms of culture, history, geographical features, industries, food and festivals. The students also had a debate on the topic “Dialogue or War” in the socio-political context of our world, and came up with very interesting facts about war.

On 30th March, there was a final presentation on what they had learnt on those 9 days. They confidently responded to the questions asked while they were projecting their work. Learners also performed dance, songs and skit to present their learnings to the audience. Through this project they learnt about the values and beliefs of different countries and showed respect towards all of them. The project ended up with great knowledge transfer among students and between facilitator and the students with lots fun thrown in as well!







Reflection Day

Good impressions make a difference, and the reflection day in the school gives students and teachers the opportunity to reflect on the learning for the year. It's also a wonderful opportunity for parents to actively recruit their children as partners in educational activities. Reflection day was celebrated on 30th March in PP classrooms.

The PP classes were festooned in colourful streamers and students made presentations and activities on topics they had learnt to the parents. They also answered questions that the parents asked about their activities with enthusiasm and confidence.

PP students celebrated their graduation day on 5th April. External Exams and Events:

The CBSE Board exams for grade 10 were conducted between February 21 and March 29. This year 21 students from our school appeared for the board exams. The CBSE board exam results 2019 is likely to be released by the first week of June. We wish our students all the very best for the results.

Cambridge Checkpoint Exams:

Cambridge Lower Secondary Checkpoint exams were conducted in the school for the first time on 8, 10 and 12 April. Seven students from grade 8 took part in checkpoint exams conducted in English, Math and Science.

Cambridge Lower Secondary Checkpoint tests have been designed to assess learners at the end of Cambridge Lower Secondary and are available in English, Mathematics and Science subjects. The tests are marked in Cambridge and provide schools with an external international benchmark for learner performance.



Field Trips and Excursions:

To give students of the pre-primary, the experience and ambience of village life, they were taken on a field trip to Shilparamam on 15 March, Friday, 2019 during school hours.

The village museum at Shilparamam, nestling amidst the trees, was the prototype of a typical Indian village with over fifteen life-sized thatched huts depicting rural and tribal lifestyles various artisans. The museum houses sculptures and life size models engaged in day-to-day activities, giving an experience that closely matches reality. Students observed carpentry set up, pottery, blacksmiths at work, few huts and some farm animals like ducks, rabbits and birds. It was an interesting and eventful day, with students acquiring hands on knowledge about arts, crafts and culture of our country.





Classroom Activities

Number logic

Math is all about logical and analytical thinking but it also has a creative angle. On 30 March, students did an activity using coloured squares to differentiate positive and negative numbers. They displayed the equations on charts coming up with unique and colourful patterns based on the equations.

Once again on 1 April 2019, students of grade-7 did a practical activity that helped them understand how to divide fractions from a whole. To enhance their creativity students made colourful pizzas and to distributed the given fractions from the whole. Students were very excited and very creative in depicting fractions in colourful ways. This activity helped the students to understand the fractions. The intricately designed pizza display on the soft board of the class looked real and mouth-watering.



At Home with Geometry





Students of grade 4 & 5 also had poster making activities. The students gave free rein to their creativity and channelled their innovative ideas into the posters which were then displayed and presented to class.




Professional Development

conceded the second game to Hyderabad before making a fightback in the third game to clinch the boys title.

The girls final too ended on similar lines. Ranga Reddy overcome stiff resistance from Hyderabad to lift the crown.

Boys Best Player - Master Nithin of Nizamabad team was adjudged the Boys Best Player while Koumidini of Ranga Reddy claimed the Girls Best Player award.
