Message from Head of the School, Ms. Padma Kolli

Dear Parents,

The pandemic has taken away the rhythm of our lives, mentally and physically. Music is one of the ways to get the rhythm back in our lives.

Listening to music has a calm and soothing effect on the body, slows down heart and pulse rate, and lowers blood pressure and stress hormone levels. Encouraging children to learn music either vocal or instrumental not only reduces stress but it also enables their cognitive development.

Cognitive development is about how children think, explore and understand the world around them. Brain development is a part of cognitive development and music helps in promoting cognitive development in children.

A study conducted by the University of Wisconsin and the University of California at

Irvine indicate that three to four-year-olds with eight months of music instruction,

including singing and keyboard lessons, averaged 43% more in IQ tests than children who weren't signed up for music lessons. Likewise, a research study conducted by Susan Hallam in 2010 at the Institute of Education, University of London, concluded that the students with formal music education tend to record higher academic scores in primary, middle and high school years.

Singing to a tune, or listening to music or playing a musical instrument helps to reduce anxiety and depression in children and in adults. Students who studied while listening to ambient music reported a reduction in stress and anxiety and improved concentration and brain function. Few types of ambient music include orchestra and recorded sounds of

waterfalls, birds, rain. The music focuses and prepares the human brain for heightened emotional excitement and concentrations. The learning of music changes brain structure and function for good. It reaches the part of the brain that other things can't reach. It is a strong cognitive stimulus that grows the brain and enhances working memory and

language skills.

Dedicated learning and practice of music instils discipline and develops children's motor skills and hand-eye coordination. One does not have to be an artist to learn the music, but one must learn music for self-growth: physical and mental.

Our continued partnership will ensure that our Lemurs continue to learn, progress and reach their potential holistically!


Science


